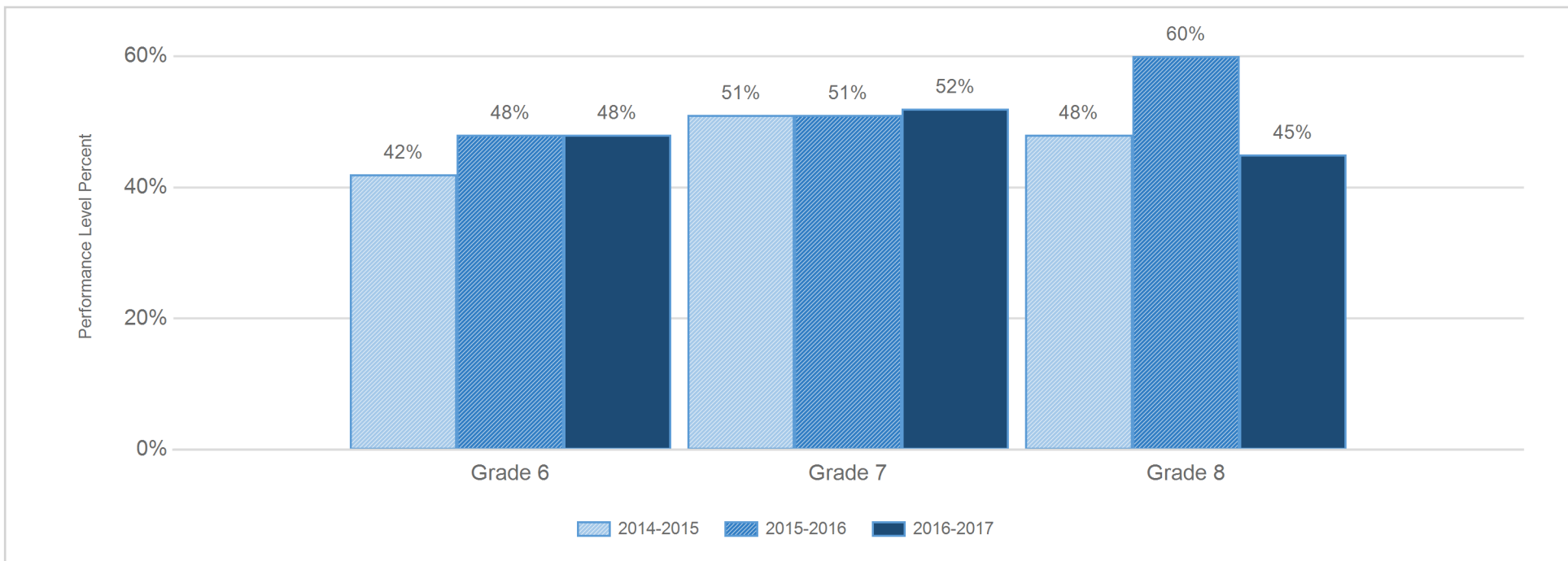

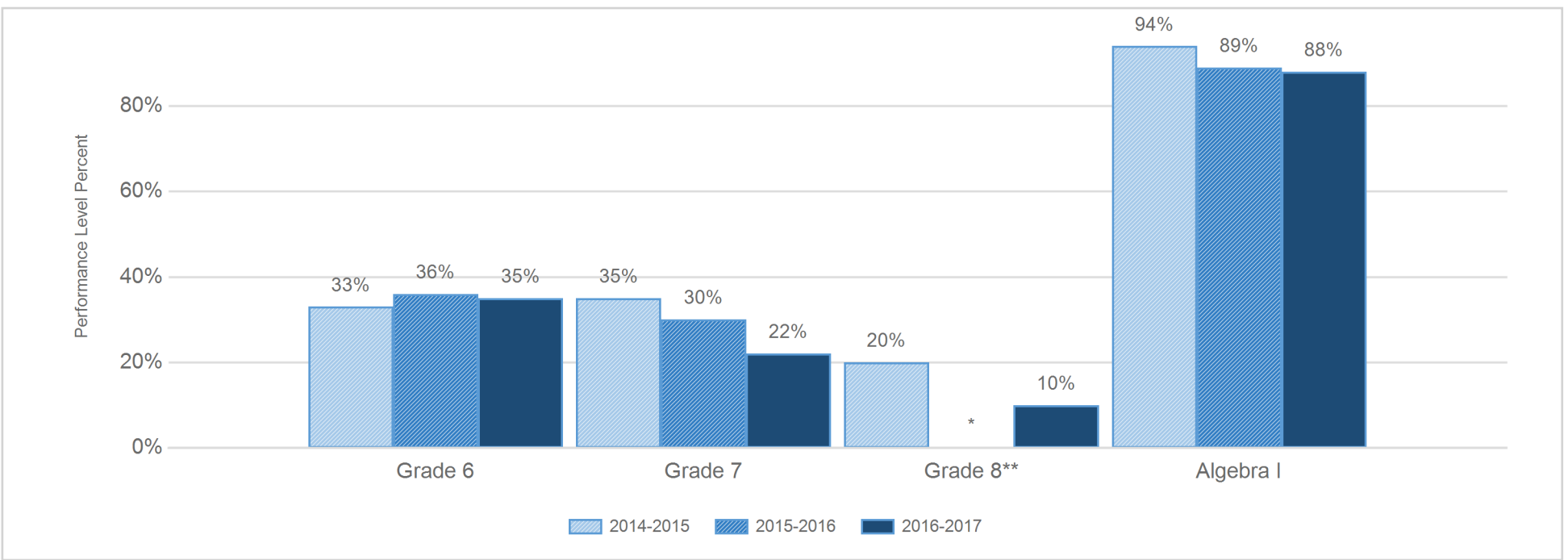


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Mathematics Assessment – Performance Trends

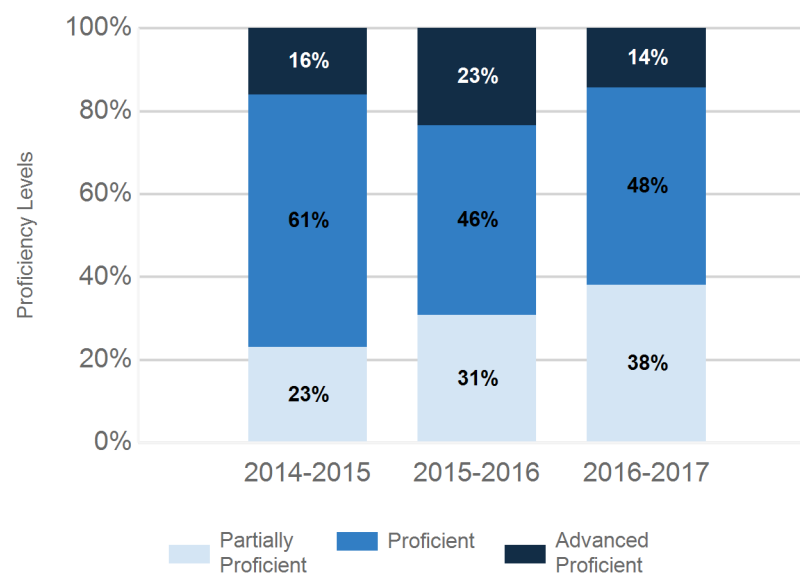

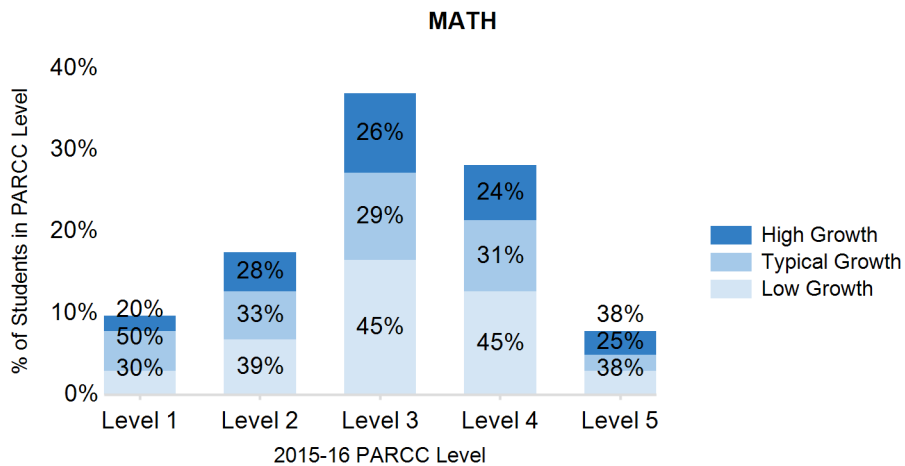
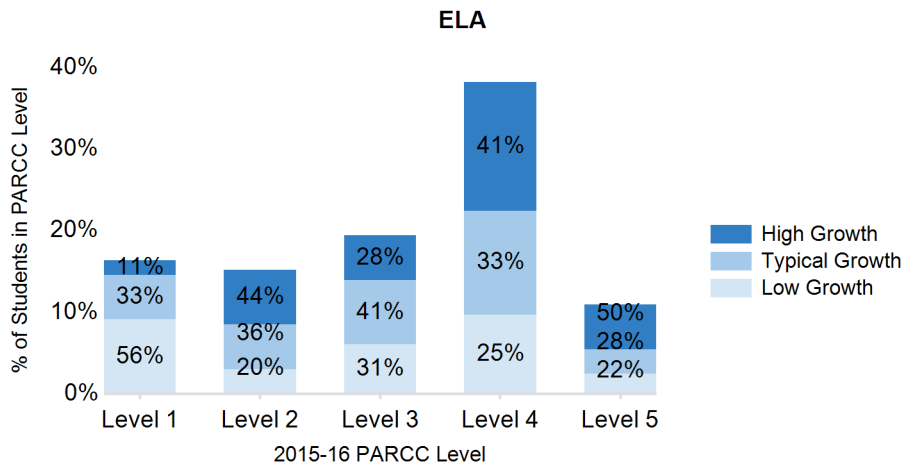

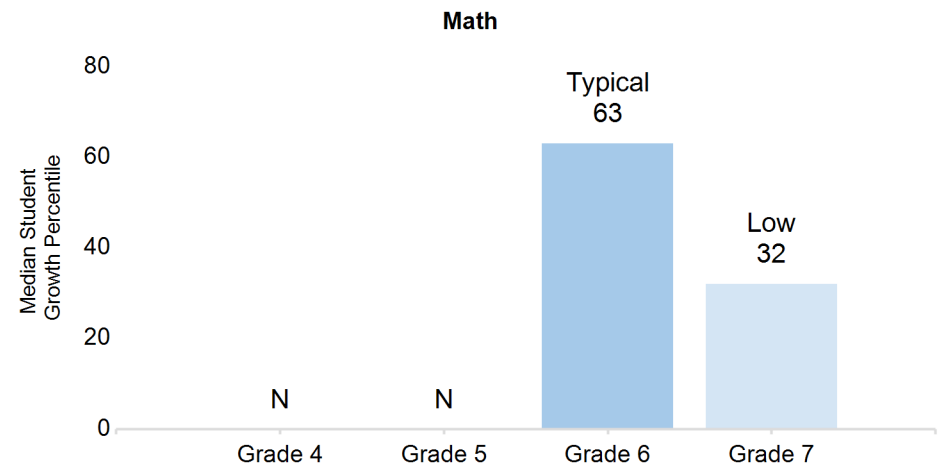
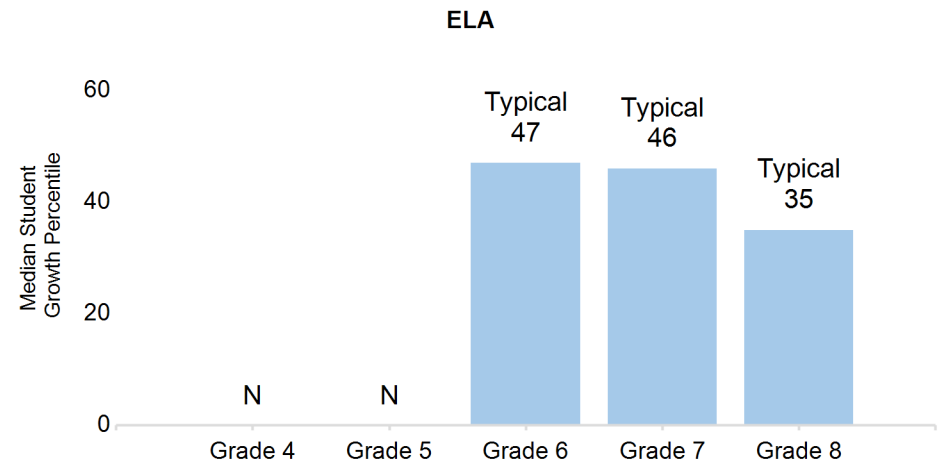

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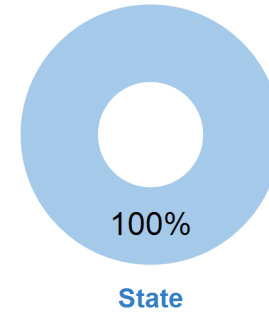
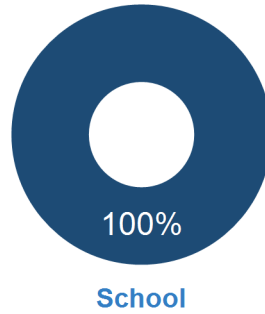

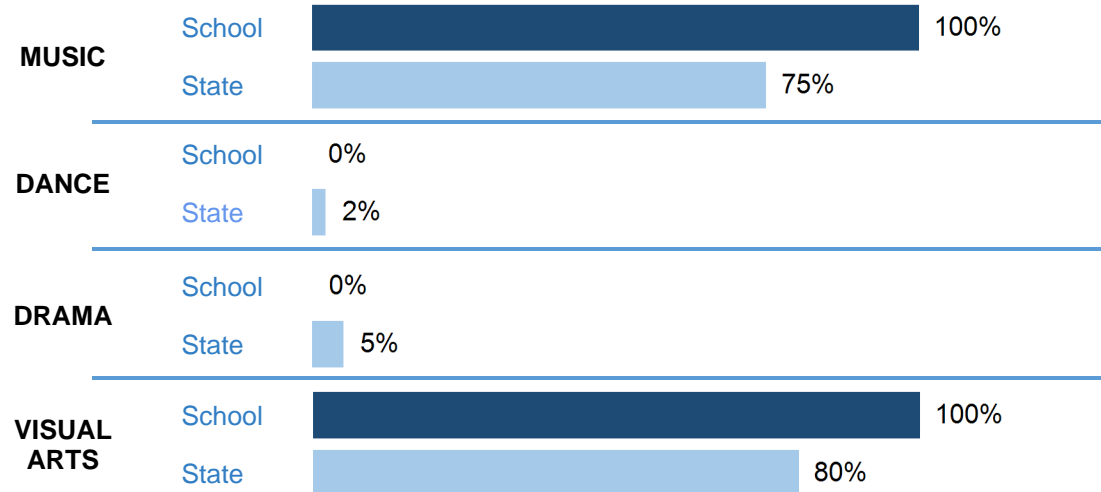

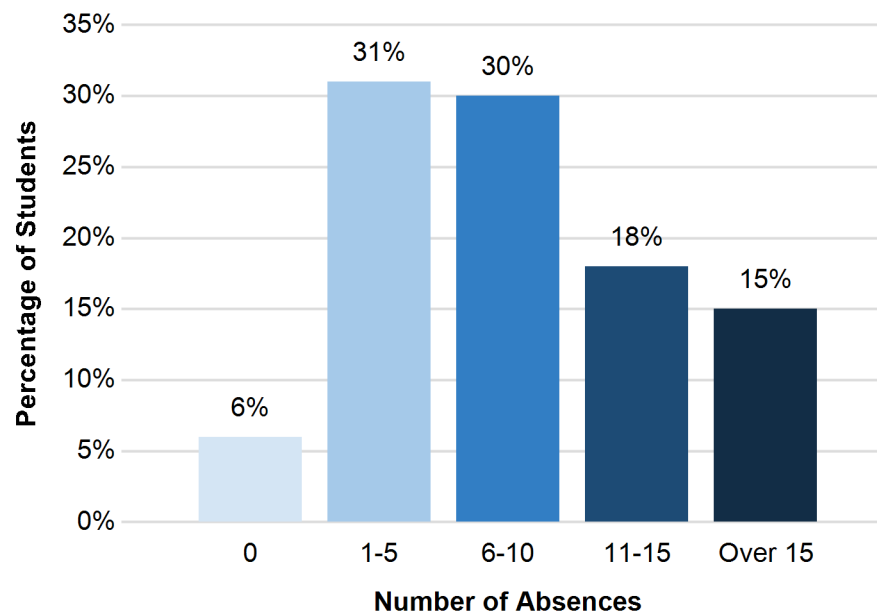

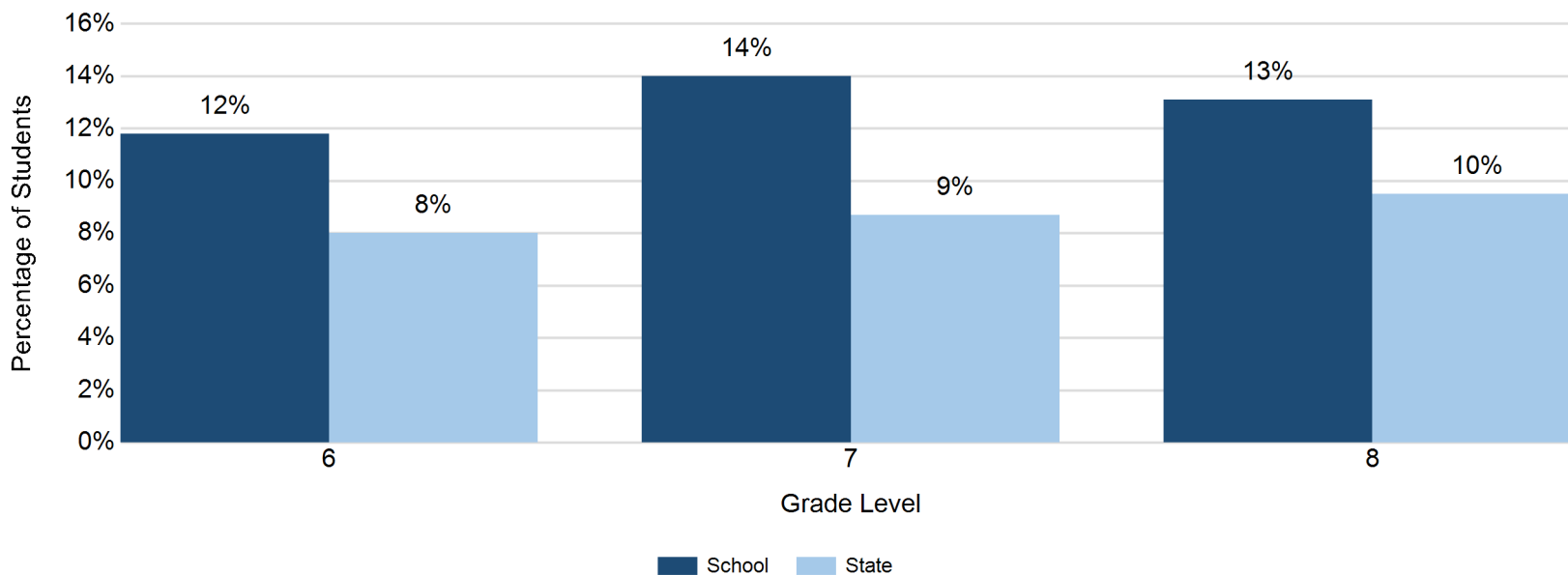

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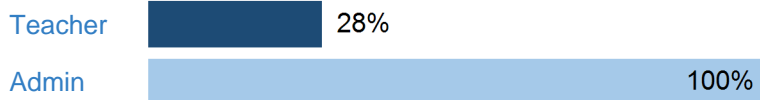
